PD GOES LOCAL

During the 2017-18 year, CPD expanded partnerships to explore the global public diplomacy landscape from a local vantage point. These included:

1. Leading the Charge on City Diplomacy

CPD is leading the charge to provide a framework for an unprecedented capacity-building program for effective city diplomacy. In partnership with the Los Angeles Mayor's Office of International Affairs, CPD hosted the first-ever "Los Angeles Summit on City Diplomacy," in April 2018, convening **21 U.S. city leaders** with international purview to explore opportunities and challenges in city diplomacy.

Panelists at the public live-streamed session moderated by CPD Director Jay Wang and introduced by USC Annenberg Dean Willow Bay included Nina Hachigian, Deputy Mayor for International Affairs, Office of the Mayor of Los Angeles; Penny Abeywardena, Commissioner for International Affairs, NYC Mayor's Office for International Affairs; Anthony Pipa, Senior Fellow, Global Economy and Development, Brookings; and Jaana Remes, Partner, McKinsey Global Institute.

2. Soft Power Through the Arts

In spring 2018, CPD's partnership with **Center Theatre Group** brought Tony Award®-winning playwright David Henry Hwang to USC for an illuminating and well-attended discussion that took guests behind the scenes of *Soft Power*, his new East-meets-West production that translates China's soft power into a piece of comedic musical theater for Los Angeles audiences. Speaking to a room of theatre-goers, students and researchers, Hwang shared insights on art as a medium for political message, cross-cultural communication and the value of cultural exchange. Sasha Anawalt, Professor and Director of USC Annenberg's Arts Journalism Program, moderated the discussion.

3. Galvanizing LA's Business Engine

"How Soft Power is Transforming Statecraft" took CPD programming out into the city to **Town Hall Los Angeles**. Following the jointly produced CPD-**Portland Communications** publication of the 2018 *Soft Power 30* report, leading practitioners—including Matthieu Clouvel, Deputy Consul General at the **Consulate General of France**; Yuko Kaifu, President of **Japan House**; and Chantal Rickards, CEO of **BAFTA Los Angeles** came together to explore innovative ways that nations are developing and deploying soft power assets with far-reaching global consequences.

4. Global Views from Across America

For the first time, CPD journeyed to the University of Oklahoma for "Public Diplomacy Goes Local," a program on what PD looks like from the vantage point of the American Heartland. Live-streamed from the Gaylord College of Journalism & Mass Communication, the event convened Mexico's former Ambassador to the U.S. Arturo Sarukhan, Jacob Poushter, Senior Researcher at the Pew Research Center, and Bo Kong from the University of Oklahoma's Department of International and Area Studies to share perspectives on the new global landscape where diplomacy is so often disrupted by geopolitics and technology. This event underscored the urgent need to build a stronger domestic constituency for effective U.S. foreign policy.


















CPD RESEARCH

CPD continued to produce timely research projects conceived in collaboration with world-class partners exploring ways to innovate existing practices as well as new directions for public diplomacy.

This year we completed an **evaluation of the European Union's public diplomacy** as well as the first phase of our joint projects with Global Ties U.S. **assessing the local impact of cultural diplomacy exchanges** and **evaluating and monitoring the Police Professionalization Exchange Program** between the United States and Mexico. CPD's **City Diplomacy Initiative** was launched in partnership with the Los Angeles Mayor's Office of International Affairs, and the consortium in which CPD will serve as primary academic partner was selected by the U.S. Department of State to mount and **evaluate the USA Pavilion at Expo 2020 Dubai**.

CPD Research Fellows

In addition to carving out its own research agenda, CPD facilitates opportunities through its Research Fellowship Program. Since 2009, a group of non-resident CPD Research Fellows is selected annually from a competitive pool of international applicants to serve a two-year term conducting original research. Project findings are published online in the *CPD Perspectives on Public Diplomacy* series or through the CPD Blog. Fellows benefit from the support and publicity through CPD's international network.

CPD PUBLICATIONS

CPD is the premier publication venue for public diplomacy scholars and practitioners. Each year, our international roster of authors contributes substantially to the expanding body of public diplomacy literature. Our publications include the *CPD Perspectives on Public Diplomacy* series, the CPD Blog, as well as policy briefs, interviews and the student-run *PD Magazine*.

Highlights of the past year in CPD publications included:



MAKING THE CASE FOR U.S. PUBLIC DIPLOMACY At the start of the fall semester, the full CPD Advisory Board, comprising fifteen prominent figures in the fields of communication and international relations, released a position paper making

the case for how well-crafted public diplomacy can enhance America's national security. The paper was based on a bipartisan op-ed in *The Hill* written by CPD Advisory Board Chair **Mel Levine**, Ambassador **Rockwell Schnabel** and CPD Director **Jay Wang**. The two publications, which championed PD as the country's best foreign policy tool, garnered positive feedback from various circles both in and out of government.



SUBNATIONAL DIPLOMACY, CLIMATE GOVERNANCE & CALIFORNIAN GLOBAL LEADERSHIP

A new report examined the emerging landscape of bottom-up global climate governance, stemming from such subnational actors as the State of California.



THE SOFT POWER 30, 2018 The second issue of the annual report and index produced by strategic communications consultancy Portland Communications in partnership with CPD uses a composite index to examine the relative strength of nation states' soft power.

The UK topped the chart for 2018, with the U.S. slipping yet another spot in the rankings, and newcomer Japan joining the top 5.

A new initiative at CPD is exploring the opportunities that virtual reality (VR) and immersive storytelling technology present for the future of public diplomacy.

South Korea in 360°

In partnership with JOVRNALISM (VR journalism), created by USC Annenberg Associate Professor of Journalism and CPD Faculty Fellow **Robert Hernandez**, *CPD 360* kicked off the collaboration with a trip to South Korea during the 2018 Winter Olympics in PyeongChang to showcase the country's unique storytelling opportunities during its time on the global stage.

Immersive Postcards from South Korea: Five 360-degree views of Korean food, the DMZ, rural seaside life, a traditional village and an ancient palace among Seoul's skyscrapers bring to life what it's like to step inside of South Korea's rich culture and history. The project received national media coverage from NPR, NBC and USA Today.

Inside Sports Diplomacy: An immersive documentary titled, *Inside Sports Diplomacy: A* 360° View of Korean *Peacebuilding through PyeongChang* 2018, features footage spanning South Korea's varied landscape. From busy Seoul to the quieter Olympic venue locales of PyeongChang and Gangneung—peering into the DMZ along the way—the *CPD* 360 team captured interviews with Korean locals who shared their perspectives on the Olympics as a unique opportunity for culture-sharing and peace.



Behind the Scenes in New York

CPD 360 next headed to New York City for an insider's view of rehearsals for *Soft Power*, an East-meets-West play with a musical written by Tony Award®-winning playwright David Henry Hwang.

Broadway's Secret Lab in 360: *Soft Power*: New York's one-and-only New 42nd Street Studios is home base for the cast and crew of the world's top theatrical shows. CPD stepped into the exclusive rehearsal space with 360-degree video technology to capture immersive views of several key performances and a special message from the playwright himself.

CPD Doctoral Dissertation Grants 2018




Grants were awarded to Mariana de Heredia (left) at Stanford University for her work on Mexico's use of literature as a public
