CPD-BBC Forum on Soft Power, visits from U.S. Under Secretary of State for Public Diplomacy and Public Affairs and ASEAN Ambassadors



On October 2, CPD joined forces with the BBC to address the question "Does Soft Power Really Matter?" Moderated by BBC host **Ritula Shah** (pictured, left), the event included a Q&A with the audience and was recorded for broadcast for the BBC's *The World Tonight* and as a special debate on the BBC's *World Service*.

Panelists included **P.J. Crowley**, George Washington University, **Robert G. Kaufman**, Pepperdine University, **Olga Oliker**, International Security and Defense Policy Center, RAND and CPD Director **Jay Wang**.

CPD hosted a roundtable a few days later on why the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) matters for Southern California with Ambassadors **Robert O. Blake, William E. Todd, Kirk Wagar and Joseph Y. Yun** currently representing the United States in Indonesia, Cambodia, Singapore and Malaysia respectively. Supporting Scholarship

Empowering the next generation and building the field of public diplomacy

This fall, CPD announced several important awards:

Anja Eifert and Yelena Osipova were selected as the recipients of the newly established **CPD Doctoral Dissertation Grants**. Eifert, currently a doctoral candidate and lecturer at the University of Leipzig in Germany, will spend the next year researching U.S. public diplomacy strategies for Indonesia, crafting analysis that is effective for both theorists and practitioners. For Osipova, an Armenian doctoral candidate at the American University School of International Service, public diplomacy initiatives in Russia are at the center of her upcoming research, as she looks at the last decade of PD and soft power, as specifically applies to the South Ossetia war in 2008 and the ongoing crisis in the Ukraine. These were the first CPD dissertation grants ever awarded.

CPD presented the 2014 **Best Student Paper Prize in Public Diplomacy** to JeeYun (Sophia) Baik, MPD '15. Her paper "Peng Liyuan: China's First Lady in Diplomacy" was selected from a number of excellent nominations made by faculty in the Master of Public Diplomacy (MPD) program at USC. This is the sixth such prize awarded by the Center.



To help recruit the best students to the MPD program, the **CPD Student Fellows program** was established in spring 2014. It is intended to provide funding for outstanding graduate students to enter the program and work at the Center. This fall, CPD welcomed Erica McNamara (left) as our first CPD Student Fellow.

Finally, from a competitive pool of international applicants three new non-resident fellows were selected for the 2014-16 **CPD Research Fellowship Program:** Adriana Erthal Abdenur (Pontifical Catholic University in Rio de Janeiro) for her project "South-South Relations and Public Diplomacy: Brazil's Development Cooperation in Africa;" Jami Fullerton (Oklahoma State University) for "A Model Country Concept: How Attitudes Towards Nations are Formed;" and Deborah L. Trent (Public Diplomacy Council) for "Gauging the Quality of Public-Private Partnership Programs Involving U.S. Based Diasporas." Each Research Fellow will oversee a substantive research project that will yield at least two outputs, including one publication for the Center's publication series, *CPD Perspectives on Public Diplomacy*, during their two-year terms. 

CPD gains two new advisory board members and extends invitation to invest in its future



LA attorney and communications expert, **Lindsey Kozberg**, is the latest public diplomacy enthusiast to be appointed to the CPD Advisory Board.

A former Vice President for External Affairs at the RAND Corporation, Kozberg currently serves as advisor

with the public strategy firm California Strategies and teaches at USC Annenberg. With more than two decades of public affairs experience spanning the White House, U.S. Department of Education, and internationally recognized think tanks, law firms, and universities, she has developed and led communications and advocacy campaigns in the public, private and nonprofit sectors, advised C-suite leaders on strategy and crisis communications and led integrated external affairs teams across multiple U.S. and international sites.

David Huebner served as the U.S. Ambassador to New Zealand and Samoa from 2009 to 2014. Under his leadership, his two Embassies became test beds of 21st Century diplomacy focused on digital media, student and future leader engagement, and whole-of-society outreach. He is the first openly LGBT person ever confirmed by the U.S. Senate to lead a diplomatic Mission.

Before being nominated by President Obama, Ambassador Huebner worked extensively in the Asia Pacific region, including as chairman and CEO of a large international law firm, founding chief representative of a law firm in Shanghai, and special policy assistant to a member of the lower house of Japan's Diet. Ambassador Huebner is now a partner in the international arbitration, public international law, and national security practices of the law firm Arnold & Porter LLP, based in Los Angeles.

"It is an honor a pleasure to join the CPD Advisory Board," said Huebner. "I vistited CPD several times while Ambassador and am impressed with the Center's vision and work. I look forward to being part of the effort."
